### What is the Institute?

The Institute is a free program for parents of children (through age 6) who have hearing loss. Parents and caregivers will learn about hearing loss and their child's individual strengths and needs. Participants will also meet other parents of children who are deaf or hard of hearing.

#### **Mission Statement**

The Institute provides information and support to families so they can make informed decisions on behalf of their child who is deaf or hard of hearing. #### More About the Institute

What do children do? Each morning the children go to classrooms with experienced teachers of children who are deaf or hard of hearing. Children receive hearing, psychological, speech, language and educational evaluations. Children will also have the chance to play with other children who have hearing loss.

What do parents do? Parents attend daily lectures by experts in the field to learn about raising a child with hearing loss. They also meet in small groups to discuss specific concerns and connect with other caregivers.
